Happy Birthday Your Majesty

Yesterday was the Queen's birthday and she is now 96 years old.

The Queen also has another birthday later on in the year. You see the Queen has **two** birthdays - her *actual* birthday is on 21st April which is the day she was born in 1926. Her second birthday is celebrated in June.

So why does the Queen have **two** birthdays, and how does she celebrate them?



The Queen simply has two birthdays due to the British weather. As the monarch's birthday is typically celebrated with outdoor events, such as Trooping the Colour, it makes more sense to celebrate in the summer, when there's a greater chance of nice weather.

This year, Queen Elizabeth II will celebrate her 96th birthday with a party fit for a queen! On 6th February this year, Her Majesty became the first British Monarch to celebrate a Platinum Jubilee, marking 70 years of service to the people of the United Kingdom, the Realms and the Commonwealth.



For this reason, the Queen's birthday celebrations this year will be **extra** special. Here in the UK there will be two extra Bank holidays for us to celebrate the Queen's jubilee.

The Queen usually spends her actual birthday with her family so Her Majesty will be joined by other members of the Royal Family with a public appearance on the balcony of Buckingham Palace.



There is usually a 41-gun salute in Hyde Park, a 21-gun salute in Windsor Great Park and a 62-gun salute at the Tower of London.



The Trooping the Colour parade also marks her official birthday.



As well as in London and Windsor, events related to the Queen's Birthday will take place throughout Great Britain. There will also be celebrations in New Zealand on the first Monday in June, in Australia on the second Monday in June and in Canada on the last weekend in May.

Earth Day 2022



Today is Earth Day. Earth Day is a celebration of the planet we live on as well as an opportunity to talk about climate change action.

All around the world people take part in events to promote climate action and encourage others to protect the planet.

Earth Day takes place every year on 22 April.

The first ever Earth Day was held in 1970 in America when 20 million people took to the streets to protest against big environmental issues that were being ignored including oil spills, polluted rivers and air pollution. This year marks 52 years since the first Earth Day took place.

A very famous supporter of Earth day and protector of the Planet is Sir David Attenborough. This week Sir David Attenborough was named a Champion of the Earth by the United Nations (UN's) Environment Programme. The award recognises the 95-year-old's commitment to telling stories about the natural world and climate change. When he accepted the award, Sir David said the world must "take action now" to protect nature and the planet.
