

Forgotten Sacrifice

Black History month ended at the start of this week. As we enter the month of November we begin to think about **Remembrance Day** which is on Friday 11th November. During the Second World War the total forces of Britain, the Commonwealth and the then British Empire toctalled just over 12.6 million. 6.5 million came from the UK and over 6.1 million came from the Commonwealth and Empire – in addition, the Commonwealth and Empire that were crucial to the Allied war effort.

But what is what is Remembrance?

Remembrance is an act of honouring those who serve, or have served, to defend our democratic freedoms and way of life

 Remembrance does not glorify war and its symbol, the red poppy, is a sign of both Remembrance and hope for a peaceful future

Who and what we Remember?

- The service and sacrifice of the Armed Forces community from Britain and the Commonwealth
- The special contribution of families and of the emergency services,
- We acknowledge innocent civilians who have lost their lives in conflict and acts of terrorism

So why do we remember?

- As thanks It is a chance for individuals, communities and the nation to honour those who serve and sacrifice to defend our way of life and who gave their today for our tomorrow.
- To bring communities together Communities across Britain irrespective of religion, race or ethnicity share a history of service and sacrifice from the two World Wars through to the present day. Remembrance is a time to reflect on what we have in common.

In 2020 the Royal British Legion and British Future launched a project with British Future called Forgotten Sacrifice, its purpose was to help ensure that the service and sacrifice of people from communities across Britain is recognised, that all feel able to take part in Remembrance activities, and to ensure all who served are fully recognised through better education, commemoration and documentation of our shared history.

Men and women of different backgrounds, colours and creeds came from across the Commonwealth have, for over one hundred years, played a crucial role in defending the freedoms we enjoy today.





Get the polio booster vaccine available for children aged one to nine years.



Polio has been detected locally. The NHS has advised all children in London aged one to nine get a polio vaccine to protect them against the potential spread of the virus.



Available in addition to your child's regular polio vaccination schedule, unless they have had a polio vaccine within the last 12 months.



The polio vaccine is safe, has been used for over 70 years, and is the best way to protect your child against disease.

Your GP practice will contact eligible families. Alternatively, visit nhs.uk/poliosites to find your local polio vaccination clinic.
